## New guidance from the Humane Slaughter Association (HSA)

A new online technical information poster has been added to the HSA's series of information and guides to best practice in the handling and slaughter of livestock and poultry. The posters can be used for quick reference in the work place or during training to help ensure best practice.

"Effective Neck Cutting of Poultry", has been designed to assist industry with EC Reg 1099/2009 in monitoring effective neck cutting practice and facilitates the identification of the carotid arteries, which are the most important blood vessels to sever because they carry oxygenated blood to the brain.

The new poster joins a comprehensive portfolio of best practice in humane handling and slaughter already available on the HSA website (<u>www.hsa.org.uk</u>). The HSA has made the technical posters and guides freely available online to enable easy access worldwide to best practice information for high animal welfare standards that might otherwise be difficult to obtain.
